However, they do address gun violence, reproductive health, gay rights, and the rise of fascism — and challenge kids to think for themselves. To the groups that are spearheading this rise in book banning, there is nothing more terrifying than individual critical thought. I am proud to stand with my fellow authors — those whose books have been banned and



those who haven't — and with PEN America to address this wave of book banning by starting in its epicenter, Florida. Together, we will fight with Floridians for the very core of intellectual freedom: the freedom to read and to think for oneself."
